What will Making Space for Nature develop?

- A **spatially** framed strategy for nature focussing action to where its most needed and/or where it will deliver the greatest benefits.
- A framework for joined-up action, developed with those that will be instrumental in its delivery.
- A set of **agreed priorities** for nature recovery, with measures to deliver.
- A **shared vision** for nature recovery and the use of nature-based solutions in Kent and Medway.
- An ambitious but realistic and deliverable plan, linked to supporting mechanisms and finance.

Network of **wildlife-rich** places across the county.



Coherent and resilient ecological network.

County thriving with wildlife and plants.

Natural landscape that inspires engagement, underpins health and wellbeing and supports the **economy**.

Nature providing solutions to some of the county's societal challenges.











What the LNRS will and won't do

- ★ Will not draw localised, detailed or definitive boundaries.
- ➤ Will not dictate actions on land or instruct their implementation.
- Will not force land owners and managers to make changes
- Will not be developed without your input.
- ➤ Will not be published without a full public consultation.
- ➤ Will not end in 2025.

- ✓ Will identify areas of Kent where the creation or improvement of habitat is likely to provide the greatest benefit
- ✓ Will identify "potential measures" to support delivery of the priority but will not instruct that they are implemented on the land.
- ✓ Will inform opportunities for funding and investment, which the government will use to encourage participation.
- Will actively seek input from farmers, landowners and managers.
- ✓ Will listen to all views on land proposed as areas of potential importance.



Development

- Development will be evidence-based, locally led and collaborative
- Must follow statutory guidance and meet LNRS regulations.
- Will be developed by a "responsible authority" Kent County Council for the Kent & Medway LNRS
- Responsible authorities are not solely responsible for delivering the strategy – it will be a shared effort with public, private and voluntary sector partners all playing a role.




Mapping of existing projects and action

Why are we creating a Land Advice Network?

- LNRS will be locally led and collaboratively developed
- To enable County scale nature recovery landowners, farmers and land managers involvement is essential to the development of the strategy
- LNRS will link to future funding opportunities, through BNG and ELMS

- ✓ What the LNRS is
- ✓ What the LNRS means for them
- ✓ How to take part in the development of the Strategy




The role of the Land Advice Network it to:

- Enable engagement with **as many landowners, farmers and land managers** as possible, through **trusted relationships**
- Provide a mechanism for two-way communication
- Equip you with knowledge and understanding so that you can help those you work with understand what the LNRS means for them and promote engagement
- Provide an opportunity for knowledge sharing across the Advisory community
- Develop **new relationships** across the County

Land Advice Network wide representation of bodies working with, and advising, farmers, land manager and landowners


- Support engagement work through established networks, forums, groups and relationships

- Provide a forum through which the Strategy can benefit the wide collective expertise within Kent.









Technical Advisory Groups

Purpose of the Technical Advisory Groups:

to provide their insights, skills, guidance and expertise to the Making Space for Nature project on a specific aspect of the LNRS development.

Not designed to enable broad stakeholder engagement but rather is a focussed group of the county's experts, selected based on their technical competency and/or experience, that will ensure the technical and/or practical soundness of the Strategy's development.

All recommendations of a TAG are advisory – the Responsible Authority, under the steer of the Delivery Group, retains responsibility for subsequent decisions and actions.

The Technical Advisory Groups will:

- Advise on specific elements of the LNRS development, providing their collective expertise to the project.
- Provide a collective and representative view and make recommendations to the Responsible Authority.
- Act as a conduit to a wider community of experts within their field.
- Provide this expertise independent of their own body's agenda, priorities and interests.

- Land advice
- Data, evidence and mapping
- Stakeholder engagement

Roles and Responsibilities

Technical Land Advice Group (Project) Land Advice Network (On-going)

- Provide expert advice on the sector
- With Landowner Officer, develop a Landowner Engagement Plan
- Help development of the advice, tools and support needed by the LAN to engage with landowners.
- Support and help to shape the formal engagement for Consultation on the strategy, once on the Draft LNRS and again on the final version prior to publication
- Active participation through monthly meetings, review of documents, feedback etc

- Provide expert advice on the sector
- Support engagement work through established networks, forums, groups and relationships, provide information about LNRS in regular events, meetings, newsletters and advisory services.

In particular work with landowners to:

- Provide insight on landowners priorities
- Identify areas where nature recovery action has already taken place.
- Help to ensure that actions developed to implement the strategy are realistic and deliverable
- Advise on how to engage with landowners who are not currently members or established groups and networks

Stakeholder Engagement Groups

Purpose of the Stakeholder Engagement Groups: to provide the opportunity for a wide and diverse number of stakeholders to comprehensively engage with and contribute to the development of the Local Nature Recovery Strategy.

The Stakeholder Engagement Groups will:

- Provide dedicated working groups focusing on a specific aspect of the LNRS's development.
- Enable engagement with stakeholders on matters specific to their area of interest and/or influence.
- Provide a forum through which the Strategy can benefit from the input of the wide collective expertise within Kent.
